Pace's presentation to feature abstraction and portraiture spanning over 50 years from the 1950s to the present

London — Pace is delighted to announce its participation in the 11th edition of Frieze London, taking place at Regent's Park from 17 - 20 October 2013. The gallery's stand (G8) will include a selection of paintings, works on paper, sculptures, photographs, video, and multimedia works spanning over 50 years from the 1950s to the present.

Featured artists include: Yto Barrada, Brian Clarke, Chuck Close, George Condo, Keith Coventry, Jim Dine, Adrian Ghenie, Kevin Francis Gray, Agnes Martin, Yoshitomo Nara, Hiroshi Sugimoto and Zhang Huan.

Portraiture and abstraction serve as central themes in the gallery's presentation. Featured as a focal point of the booth will be a large-scale oil on canvas self-portrait by the American artist Chuck Close. For more than 50 years, Close has painted portraits and self-portraits that are as abstract as they are realistic, executed in a diverse range of media and techniques.

Included in Pace's presentation will also be two vividly coloured oil on linen paintings by the Chinese artist Zhang Huan. Pace's presentation of new works from Zhang Huan's critically acclaimed series, *Poppy Fields*, coincides with the artist's sold out exhibition at Pace New York which will remain on view until 26 October. Occupying much of the artist's practice over the past three years, these densely layered paintings draw inspiration from ancient Tibetan dance masks to the hallucinatory imagery of opium smokers and the Cultural Revolution.

Pace's presentation at Frieze will also feature Hiroshi Sugimoto's magisterial black and white photographic portrait of Queen Victoria from 1999. *The Love Suicides at Sonezaki*, a production of Japanese *bunraku* puppet theater directed by Sugimoto will also be on view in Paris at the Théâtre de la Ville from 10 -19 October.

Further highlights include *India Standing*, a new marble sculpture by Northern-Ireland born artist Kevin Francis Gray whose sculptures explore the complex relationship between abstraction and figuration. Next November, Pace London will present the artist's inaugural solo exhibition at 6 Burlington Gardens. The exhibition will be on view from 21 November to 25 January 2014.

Pace is a leading contemporary art gallery representing many of the most significant international artists and estates of the 20th and 21st centuries. Founded by Arne Glimcher in Boston in 1960 and led by Marc Glimcher, Pace has been a constant, vital force in the art world and has introduced many renowned artists' work to the public for the first time. Pace has mounted more than 700 exhibitions, including scholarly presentations that have subsequently travelled to museums, and has published nearly 400 exhibition catalogues. Today, Pace has seven locations worldwide: four in New York; two in London; and one in Beijing. Pace inaugurated its flagship gallery at 6 Burlington Gardens with the exhibition *Rothko/Sugimoto: Dark Paintings and Seascapes* last October.

Mingei: Are You Here? 6 -10 Lexington Street

Opening: Monday 14 October, 6-8 pm

Mingei: Are You Here? explores the legacy of Mingei, a Japanese folk craft movement led by philosopher and critic Sōetsu Yanagi and questions the presence of craftsmanship in contemporary art.

The exhibition features 80 works and special commissions by more than 25 artists, including paintings, sculptures, works on paper, ceramics, and textile shown in a vitrine inspired by ethnographic exhibitions. Systems of display and practical aspects of museum work are the central themes of the exhibition.

Curated by Nicolas Trembley, this museum-quality exhibition juxtaposes historical works by Japanese Mingei artists with modern and contemporary artists, designers and architects inspired by the philosophy of Mingei. Pace's artists featured in the exhibition include Josef Albers, Isamu Noguchi, Hiroshi Sugimoto, Lee Ufan and specifically for this exhibition: Ruth Asawa, Valentin Carron, Willem de Rooij, Trisha Donnelly, Simon Fujiwara, Bernard Leach, Jasper Morrison, Charlotte Perriand, Danh Vo and more.
